

# The University of Helsinki



# University of Helsinki Digital Glossary

#### Sisu

Sisu is the university system where you can plan your studies and register for courses. Find more information about using Sisu here.

#### Weboodi

Weboodi is the university system that was in place before Sisu was introduced. Weboodi is still accessible here, and can be used for things like checking your course registrations and downloading your transcript. However, you can do all these things in Sisu too - better to learn how to do them there, as Weboodi will eventually be discontinued.

#### Study plan

All degrees include a personal study plan (PSP), which is drawn up in Sisu. In your study plan, you outline the studies you intend to complete. You will receive more information about preparing this during the course Orientation to Changing Education. You do not have to complete the plan all at once, but rather can update it as your studies progress.


#### Moodle

Moodle is the learning environment where you will be able to access course materials and pre-recorded lectures, as well as submit your assignments. You will receive a registration key for each of your courses, allowing you to access all the resources and information you need for your studies.

# How do

### Register for courses?

Registration for studies happens in Sisu, but for the courses happening in the first period your teachers will take care of registering you. This means you will only have to register later on in the semester for courses starting in the second period. There will also be more guidance on how to do this in the Orientation course.



### Get a student card?

All students who have registered for attendance and paid the Student Union's membership fee are entitled to a student card. The easiest way to get one is by downloading **Frank App**, where you can enter your details and be able to access a digital student card that is valid for proving your student status. If you'd like a physical card, you can order that for a fee. More information here.

# Check the University's coronavirus situation

### Organise my studies?

You can check the schedule for courses here. By searching each course individually, all the info will pop up. The first three compulsory courses in CE will be: Orientation to Changing Education, Finnish Education System and Topical Issues in Educational Research. Once you've been registered for the courses, you'll also be able to see the schedule in Sisu.

### Get my University user account?

You can receive your IT user account online. Information on how to do so was sent in a newsletter over the summer. You can also find it in the university webpage under "How can I activate my University of Helsinki IT user account".



# The University Library

Kaisa Talo, the main university library, is a true architectural gem and the perfect place to study if you need a break from being at home. Many student services are also available at the main desk during customer service hours.

#### UniCafe

Unicafes offer the cheapest and most filling meal in town for students. Although there are UniCafes all over campus, many of them are currently closed due to the pandemic.

The ones closest to the Faculty of Educational Sciences which are currently open are Kaivopiha and Porthania (in Kaisa Library) - you can check the menu and opening times <a href="https://example.com/here/">here</a>.

Remember to set up your student card on Frank App once you've completed your registration, so you can access the student discount, which means lunch will only cost 2.70€ (2.60€ for vegan lunch).

#### Student life

## Tips for studying remotely

Studying remotely can sometimes be challenging - here are our best tips from a year of remote CE studies:

- 1. Make your "study corner" as comfortable as you can. This will look a little different for everyone, but it might include investing in a comfortable chair and an extra monitor. You can also prioritise making your home cosy in small ways like adding cute photos to your desk, so you'll be happier to spend time there.
- 2. Take breaks, exercise, spend time outdoors. This is really important! See the wellbeing page for suggestions on places to explore.
- 3. **Connect with your classmates** during and after classes. Even if you're not meeting face to face for lectures, don't be afraid to reach out about studying together, following lectures from the same place, or just going for a coffee (being mindful of any restrictions in place).
- 4. And lastly, if you need a change of scenery, that's okay too! Cafés can be an exciting but expensive choice, but **university libraries and premises** (such as the study centre <u>Minerva</u>) are now open. Wear your favourite mask and enjoy the novelty of studying outside of home!

# Registering with the Authorities: Key Terms!

Yes-we are sorry we are starting with the most boring part right at the beginning. But registering with the authorities is a very important step. We know that the process can be very confusing, long and overwhelming... but don't worry! We have all been there and can tell you that there is an end! :)

# Finnish-ID Number / Personal Identity Code/Social security number

The personal identity code (or Finnish ID number, or social security number-all refer to the same) is a way of identification used in Finland. IT is used everywheeere, so it is very important to get one. It has 10 digits: 9 numbers (first 6 correspond toyour bith date) and one letter. You will get one after registering with the authorities as well as your residence.

### Migri-Finnish Immigration Office

At Migri, EU students can register their right of residence. They are also responsible for residence permits for non-EU students or those who need one.

## Digital and Population Data Services Agency (DVV)

In DVV, you can registeryour permanent residence in Finland and then get the Finnish ID number. This office is also responsible for other population matters such as change of names, marriage certificates, children's certificate...

Now that you know the key terms, read the steps recommended to register:

#### **EU-Students**

Eu students do not need a residence permit, but you need to register your EU-right of residence at Migri within the first 3 months and get a permanent address at DVV.

- Fill the online form for EU-registration at migri webpage and make an appointment to visit a service point. The EU registration costs 49€.
   Please note: there can be very long queues to get an appointment in migri, so just keep looking and refreshing the webpage! Until you don't visit a service point, your registration will not be completed.
- Then, register your permanent address at DVV by email. <u>Click here</u> for more instructions.
- You need a permanent address for the HSL travel card discount and for opening a bank account.
- The permanent address cannot be given before the EU registration.
- Once you have it, send the last four digits of your Finnish ID personal number to the student services by email: studentinfo@helsinki.fi.s (note the s at the end for secure email, never send your full name and full identity code together in normal email)

# Citizens of Nordic Countries

- It is necessay to apply for a Finnish ID number and register the permanent address at DVV.

# Non-EU/EEA students

#### (including UK citizens)

- You will need a residence permit to come to Finland.
   Apply for it before coming to Finland.
- Once in Finland, you need to register the permanent address in DVV and apply for the Finnish personal number (unless you already received one in your residence permit)
- Make an appointment (choosing international registrations) and visit the DVV office).
- You need a permanent address for the HSL travel card discount and for opening a bank account.
- Once you have it, send the last four digits of your
  Finnish ID personal number to the student services
  by email: studentinfo@helsinki.fi.s (note the s at the
  end for secure email, never send your full name and
  full identity code together in normal email)

#### Important:

On Monday, 20th September from 13-14:00 we have an appointment for our group to DVV. In this appointment, you can register yourself to get the Finnish ID personal number and permanent resident. You will need:

- Registration form printed and filled out
- Passport or EU ID card
- Residence permit (if applicable)
- EU citizen's registration document (if applicable)
- Certificate of student status
- Complete address (including number of appartment/ room).

You can also book an appointment other day by yourself at https://isl.ajanvaraus.fi/frontend/ selecting "international registrations".

If you still don't have your EU registration from Migri confirmed this day, then you will only be able to register your residence as temporary and not permanent . You can still come to this appointment, and then change the residence from temporary-permanente by email when you get the Migri confirmation.

This is the form you need to fill in.

- In order to register permanently, your residence permit must be valid for at least 12 months and your study certificate for at least 2 years. The permanent address is important if you want to get the student discount for your travel card.

Please note that we need your COMPLETE address, also the apartment number, so please check it before you visit us!

The approximate processing time for the registration is 8-10 weeks. You will get an e-mail as a confirmation when your registration is ready. It will be a secure e-mail that can be opened only on one device for 30 days. You can download and save the attachment for later use.

### Helsinki Public Transport (HSL)



HSL manages the public transport in the Helsinki region (including Espoo, Vantaa...). That is why there are different zones (A-B-C-D) and the fares change depending on these areas. Helsinki city centre corresponds to zone A. There are several options for public transport: tram, metro, buses and city bikes\* And yes, there is a student discount! You can check the student fares in each zone in the <u>following link</u>.

Please note that in order to get the student discount, you would need to have your permanet residence in Helsinki region confirmed (i.e., first register at DVV): https://www.hsl.fi/en/tickets-and-fares/discounted-travel/student-discount. While registering at DVV; ask for a form to get the municipality prices. After you have received the Finnish personal ID and registration confirmed, you will be eligible for the student discount and get the form needed at the filled at the <u>Student Services points</u>

#### Don't forget to download the HSL App!

City Bikes operate from 1st April to 31st October. The whole season pass costs 35€. You can take a bike from the bike stations, and use it for a max of 30 min each time. There are unlimited number of rides with the season pass, but always up to 30 min. More info.

From 17th August-15th September, 30 days season tickets will be at half price! (Student discount is usually 45%). More info.

#### **HOAS**

HOAS is the main student housing provider in Helsinki region, with apartments in Helsinki, Espoo and Vantaa. There are several options: room in a shared apartments, studios or family apartments. For applying, it is recommended to select as many areas as possible and be flexible with the apartment options (the waiting time for studios can be up to 9 months in average). Please note, that most of the apartments are unfurnished. Also, don't forget to update your application every month!




#### **Other Options**

Finding accommodation in Helsinki can be tricky. But no worries, there are many options so we are sure you'll find something!


The most important thing is to apply as soon as possible and through many different channels. Here we have just summarized the main housing companies, but feel free to check other options and more information in the following links!

## Taking Care of your well-being around Helsinki!

It is very important to take care of your well-being, especially when moving to a new city. Fortunately, there are many beautiful spots around the city that are great to go for a walk and unwind after studying indoors or remotely! These are just some examples of them:





Finland is well-know for the lakes and all the nature! There are many national parks around the country and in Helsinki too! It is a great idea for camping or just for a day trip! The two closest to Helsinki are: Nuuksio (the pict on the left) or Sipoonkorpi and they are both accessible by public transport!



Helsinki is surrounded by many beaches and parks all around the city! Such as Herttoniemi beach (pic on the left), Hietaniemi beach (beautiful sunsets), Töölö Bay, Kaivopuisto (pic above, in the city centre), Esplanade, Sibelius Park, Kaisaniemi Park & Botanic Garden...

And there are many islands around the city, which are great to go for walks or picnics! Like Suomenlinna (pic below), Vallisaari, Seurasaari (by public transport), Pihlajasaari (by ferry), Uunisaari (pic on the right), Mustikkamaa (close to the city centre), Lonna, Lammassaari...

(and yes, saari means island in Finnish:P)







# Which mobile company to choose?

Choosing a mobile company might feel a bit overwealming once you first arrive in a new country. Here we listed the main ntework providers who offer plenty of options from prepaid SIM card to contracts



#### Getting a SIM card

There are three different options available when thinking of getting a new SIM card:

Prepaid/Contract /Contract with devise

All the above mentioned network operators have shops all around Finland. Please keep in mind that if you want to get a contract type of a plan different network operators have different requirements. You can even buy prepaid SIM-cards from kiosks, supermarkets, Make your own research since at times there might be several students discounts as well through your Frank App.

# Three main networks:

Elisa, Telia and DNA are the main network providers in Finland.
Overall, we can say that all network operators cover the area of Finland providing 2G, 3G, 4G while 5G and 6g are developing.



#### **HSL**

If you are planning to explore Helsinki the HSL Mobile app is for you! It works like a ticket machine in your pocket. The app is easy to use and you can use it for buying tickets, finding routes and navigating yourself aroud.



#### ResQ

The ResQ app is a Finnish based app that offer you the possibility to resque food from the gastronomy business that otherwise would end up to food waste. Through ResQ app you can have good quality foos from restaurants around the city for a reduced price.



#### <u>MobilePay</u>

MobilePay is a mobile payment application that makes our lives easier as it is a digital wallet covering different payment needs.
Payments to friends, smaller physical shops and payments online are way easier.

# How to open a bank account in Finland

Since you will be studying in Finland for a longer time it is highly recommended to open a Finnish bank account. In order to ease this procedure we have put together a list with the documents you will need. Take a deep breath and let's get started! Please keep in mind that several banks might have slightly different requirements. You are advised to make your own research as well regarding the several banking options you have!

# Passport/ Resident permit card (if applicable)/Certificate of student status

While each bank has its own requirements you will most likely need acombination of the above mentioned documents in order to open a bank account in Finland. Please, before you walk in make sure you call ahead to clarify the exact paperwork you will need and to book an appointment for your visit.

Side note: Please keep in mind that in most banks you can get your bank account immediately but getting a Visa Electron card and access to online banking might take longer.

Please notice that there are more banks than the above mentioned. The practice of opening a bank account defers according to the bank and branch in Finland.

S-. Market - Finnish grocery store chain


Lidl - Has large variety of fresh and international product offers on a weekly basis.
